## On Quasi-Linear Elliptic Equations which Arise from Variational Problems

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1. Introduction. Consider the non-parametric variational problem

$$\delta \iint F(u,v) \ dx \ dy = 0;$$

where  $\varphi(x, y)$  is the extremal function, and  $u = \varphi_x$ ,  $v = \varphi_v$ . Assume that  $F_{uu}F_{vv} - F_{uv}^2 > 0$ . The Euler equation is then the quasi-linear elliptic equation

$$(1) F_{uu}\varphi_{xx} + 2F_{uv}\varphi_{xy} + F_{vv}\varphi_{yy} = 0.$$

The minimal surface equation arises if  $F = (1 + u^2 + v^2)^{\frac{1}{2}}$ , and has the property, first proven by S. Bernstein [1], that any solution defined for all values of (x, y), is necessarily a linear function. Generalizations of Bernstein's theorem to wider classes of equations have been given by Bers [2], Finn [3], and Finn & Gilbarg [4]. Heinz [5] has obtained a new proof of Bernstein's theorem as a consequence of a deeper result; namely, the existence of an *a priori* estimate of the curvature of a solution of the minimal surface equation.

A conservation law of equation (1) is a pair of functions  $\Theta(u, v)$ ,  $\Lambda(u, v)$  for which

$$\Theta(u,v)_x + \Lambda(u,v)_y = 0$$

in the domain of any solution  $\varphi(x, y)$ . Equation (1) always possesses three natural conservation laws, since, as is well known, the differentials

$$d\psi = F_{v} dx - F_{u} dy,$$

$$d\xi = F - vF_{v} dx + vF_{u} dy,$$

$$d\eta = uF_{v} dx + F - uF_{u} dy$$

are exact. In the case of the minimal surface equation, Nitsche [7] has used

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
