## The Wave Operator and Lp Norms

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1. Introduction. In the theory of elliptic partial differential equations  $L_p$  estimates of the solution and its derivatives in terms of the given data play a vital role. (See, for instance, the recent paper by Agmon, Douglis & Nirenberg [1].) It is therefore of interest to ask to what extent, if any, estimates of this type hold for hyperbolic equations, for example the wave equation. Now,  $L_2$  estimates have long been an important tool in the theory of hyperbolic equations. For example, it is a well known fact that solutions of the wave equation

possess the energy conservation property, provided they satisfy appropriate boundary or initial conditions. Thus, if  $u = u(x_1, x_2, \dots, x_n, t)$  is a solution of (1) having compact support in x-space (for each t), then the energy

$$E(t) = \int_{x-\text{adde}} \left( \sum_{i=1}^{n} \left( \frac{\partial u}{\partial x_i} \right)^2 + \left( \frac{\partial u}{\partial t} \right)^2 \right) dx$$

is really independent of t. If we replace the wave equation by a linear second order hyperbolic equation, then solutions of that equation with compact support in x will have the property that although E(t) need not be a constant, it does depend boundedly on E(0) for each fixed t.

Question No. 1. To what extent can these estimates be extended to values of  $p \neq 2$ ? The author has recently obtained the following result (see [4]):

If we define

$$E_{p}(t) = \int_{t=1}^{n} \left( \sum_{i=1}^{n} \left| \frac{\partial u}{\partial x_{i}} \right|^{p} + \left| \frac{\partial u}{\partial t} \right|^{p} \right) dx,$$

**Theorem 1.** An estimate of the type

$$(1.2) E_{p}(t) \leq C(t)E_{p}(0)$$

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
