Modifications and Cobounding Manifolds, IV

Introduction. This paper is a sequel to [4], [5], [6] and the notations and definitions of these papers will be used here.

It has already been shown [6] that if cobounding manifolds M_1 and M_2 contain basic complexes, then it is possible to transform one into the other by a specially simple sequence of modifications. The object here is to try to simplify this sequence still further in the even dimensional case. In the present paper M_1 and M_2 will be joined together, thus forming a bounding manifold, or, what is the same thing, the case $M_2 =$ a sphere will be considered. Then M_1 bounds a manifold M, and the crucial point in the reduction is the killing of the homology of M modulo M_1 . This involves generalizing the results of Wall [4] to the relative case, and this extension occupies most of the present paper. The final result, giving a simplified sequence of modifications transforming an even dimensional bounding manifold to a sphere, appears as Theorem 10.2.

1. A manifold with boundary and basic complex. Let M be a differentiable manifold of dimension 2m + 1 with boundary M_1 . Let M contain a basic complex L, satisfying the conditions of [6], §9, up to dimension m - 1. Also let M_1 contain a basic complex L_1 , and suppose that this has been arranged, as in [6], Theorem 9.7, to satisfy the basic complex conditions up to dimension m - 1.

It is desirable at this point to ensure that $H_m(M)$ has a free generator carried by a skew embedded m-sphere in M_1 . If this condition is not already satisfied, the following adjustment must be made. Apply to M_1 a modification ϕ of type (m-1,m), shrinking the boundary of an m-cell which does not meet L_1 , and carry out the modification in such a way that this cell is closed up to form an m-sphere whose normal bundle in $\phi(M_1)$ has characteristic class mapping on 1 under the inclusion $\pi_{m-1}(R_m) \to \pi_{m-1}(R_{m+1})$ when the latter group is Z or Z_2 . Of course when $\pi_{m-1}(R_{m+1}) = 0$ the question of introducing this condition does not arise. Denote by M'_1 the result of applying the modification ϕ , and let M' be the union of its trace with M, the common subset M_1 being identified in the obvious way. There are two m-spheres in M'_1 associated with ϕ , one obtained by closing up an m-cell as just described, the other being the sphere introduced by the modification in the sense of [6], §3. The latter bounds a cell in M', while the former carries a cycle in M' which is not homologous to zero. Let α_0 be the corresponding element of $H_m(M')$.

Comparing the homology of M' with that of M, it is clear that $H_i(M) = H_i(M')$ for i < m, and $H_m(M') = H_m(M) \oplus \{\alpha_0\}$, where \oplus denotes direct summation
