## On the Dual Pontrjagin Classes of a Manifold

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Introduction. This paper is devoted to proving that for manifolds of dimension n certain poylnomials in the dual Pontrjagin classes must be zero modulo q an odd prime. The methods are similar to those used by William Massey in his paper "On the Stiefel-Whitney Classes of a Manifold" [7] in which he showed that for certain values of n and k the (n-k)-dimensional dual Stiefel-Whitney class of an n-dimensional manifold is always zero. Later William Massey and Franklin Peterson showed that these results were, for non-orientable manifolds, the best possible [8]. In 1962 Edgar Brown Jr. and Franklin Peterson determined all the relations that the Stiefel-Whitney classes of a manifold must satsify [3].

The results of this paper are a step toward solving the much more difficult problem of determining all the relations that the Pontrjagin classes of an *n*-dimensional manifold must satisfy.

Theorem 3 of this paper is slightly stronger than a similar theorem proven for the author's Ph.D. thesis submitted to Brown University [10]. Theorem 1 and 2 were suggested to the author by a paper of Yasurô Tomanaga who was working on the problem independently in the modulo 3 case only [11]. However, Theorem 1 taken modulo 3 is a little stronger than Tomonaga's.

1.  $M^n$  is a compact, connected, oriented, and differentiable manifold throughout the paper. Following the notation of John Milnor [9], let  $\xi$  be a real vector bundle with base space  $M^n$ , total space  $E_{\xi}$ , projection  $\pi_{\xi}$  and fibre  $R^m$ . Let  $E_{\xi,0}$  denote the set of non zero vectors of  $E_{\xi}$ . There exists a canonical class

$$(1.1) U_{\xi} \varepsilon H^{n}(E_{\xi}, E_{\xi,0}; Z_{q}),$$

where  $Z_q$  is the ring of integers modulo an odd prime q. The Thom isomorphism  $\phi_{\ell}$  [9] is defined as follows:

$$\phi_{\xi} : H^{*}(M^{n}; Z_{a}) \to H^{*}(E_{\xi}, E_{\xi, 0}; Z_{a}),$$

$$\phi_{\xi}(x) = [\pi_{\xi}^{*}(x)]U_{\xi}.$$

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
