## III Appendix\*

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1. Introduction. In two previous papers of the same title [1], [2] we discussed the Cauchy data for the Einstein-Maxwell equations

$$(1.1) R_{\lambda}^{\prime\prime} - \frac{1}{2}R\delta_{\lambda}^{\prime\prime} = P_{\lambda}^{\prime\prime},$$

with the given stress-energy tensor

$$(1.2) P_{\lambda}^{"} \stackrel{\text{def}}{=} \mu u_{\lambda} u^{"} + F_{\lambda}^{"} + p \delta_{\lambda}^{"},$$

where  $F_{\lambda}$  is the momentum energy tensor of an electromagnetic field of the first or second class (*i.e.* not a null field). (The problem of Cauchy data for a special case of the equation (1.1) concerning the third class was considered in [3].) The stress-energy tensor (1.2) appearing in (1.1) can have only the following real characteristics

The equation (1.1) represents 10 differential equations for 10 unknown potentials  $g_{\lambda\mu}$ . It was shown in [1], [2] that the number 10 can be reduced to  $N \leq 6$  scalar functions. The following table indicates the corresponding results
