Dissipative Ordinary Differential Operators'

Introduction. We shall study the initial value problem for dissipative differential systems in one spatial variable of the form

(1.1)
$$y_t = (Ay)_x + By, -\infty \le a < x < b \le \infty, t > 0,$$

and

$$(1.2) y_t = (Ay_x)_x + (By)_x + Cy, -\infty \le a < x < b \le \infty, t > 0$$

by means of the theory of semi-groups of operators.

Section 1 is devoted to the system (1.1). Here $y = (\eta^1, \eta^2, \dots, \eta^k)$ is a function of x and t with values in a k-dimensional complex Euclidean space E^k , A and B are $k \times k$ matrix-valued functions of x alone, A being Hermitian and of constant rank with p positive and n negative eigenvalues, which together with B satisfies the condition

$$D = B + B^* + A_x \le 0, \quad a < x < b,$$

where B^* is the adjoint matrix to B under the usual inner product in E^k defined by

$$(y,z) = \sum_{i=1}^{k} \eta^{i} \tilde{\zeta}^{i}$$
, with $|y| = [(y,y)]^{1/2}$.

Further, we assume that the elements of A(x) are absolutely continuous on each compact subinterval of (a, b) and that the elements of A_x and B are square integrable on each compact subinterval of (a, b).

Physical considerations suggest that we impose boundary conditions on y such that

$$(1.3) (Ay, y)^b - (Ay, y)^a \le 0.$$

Boundary conditions of this kind will be called *dissipative*.

The Cauchy problem for the system (1.1) can now be formulated as follows: We require of the operator

$$(1.4) Ly = (Ay)_r + By_r$$

with a domain D(L) suitably restricted by dissipative boundary conditions, that it generate a strongly continuous semi-group of linear bounded operators,
