Convolutions of Convex Functions*

1. Introduction. Let K be the class of functions f which are regular and univalent in the disk $E = \{z : |z| < 1\}$ with f(0) = 0 and f(E) convex. Using some results of Paatero [3, pp. 67 & 72] we show that if $f \in K$ then f can have at most two discontinuities on the boundary of the disk (the function being defined on the boundary by taking $f(e^{i\theta}) = \lim_{r \to 1} f(re^{i\theta})$).

Pólya and Schoenberg [4, p. 325] have conjectured that if $\sum_{1}^{\infty} a_n z^n \in K$ and $\sum_{1}^{\infty} b_n z^n \in K$ then $F(z) = \sum_{1}^{\infty} a_n b_n z^n \in K$. Theorem 4 of this paper shows that F(z) given above is close-to-convex. This result is obtained by showing that functions given by a certain integral representation are close-to-convex and then that F(z) has this representation.

Theorem 5 extends the known result: if $f \in K$ and θ is a fixed real number then

$$g(z) = \frac{f(z) - f(e^{i\theta}z)}{1 - e^{i\theta}}$$

is starlike (i.e. g(E) is starlike with respect to the origin), to show that forfixed real r and θ , $0 \le r \le 1$, the function

$$g(z; r, \theta) = \frac{f(z) - f(re^{i\theta}z)}{1 - re^{i\theta}}$$

is starlike. Since this implies

$$\int_0^z \frac{g(w; r, \theta)}{w} dw \, \varepsilon \, K,$$

it follows that the conjecture of Pólya and Schoenberg as stated above holds in the case

$$b_n = \frac{1 - r^n e^{in\theta}}{n(1 - re^{i\theta})} ,$$

where θ is real and $0 \le r \le 1$.
