The Initial-Boundary Value Problem for a Non-Linear Hyperbolic Equation in Relativistic Quantum Mechanics*

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Abstract. Considerable attention has been focused on the equation

$$u_{tt} - \Delta u + u |u|^{\gamma} = f \qquad (\gamma > 0)$$

in the last four years. This paper is concerned with the corresponding initial-boundary value problem. Existence theorems for weak and strict solutions and continuity of weak solutions with respect to the data of the problem are established.

1. Introduction. Non-linear hyperbolic equations of the special form

(1.1)
$$u_{tt} - \Delta u + u |u|^{\gamma} = f \qquad (\gamma > 0),$$

have been of considerable interest to mathematicians and physicists in recent years. The case $\gamma=2$ in 4-dimensional space-time is important in relativistic quantum mechanics. The function u represents some field quantity and the inhomogeneous term f represents sources of energy in the field. Possible interactions of the field with itself are described by the non-linear term. The initial-boundary value problem for equation (1.1) has the following (classical) formulation. It is required to find a function u=u(x,t) which satisfies (1.1) for $x \in \Omega$, t>0, and the initial conditions

$$(1.2) u(x, 0) = u_0(x), x \varepsilon \Omega,$$

$$(1.3) u_{\iota}(x, 0) = u_{1}(x), x \varepsilon \Omega,$$

and the boundary condition

(1.4)
$$u(x, t) = 0, t \ge 0, x \varepsilon \partial \Omega.$$

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
