An Invariant Formulation of the New Maximum-Minimum Theory of Eigenvalues*

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1. Introduction. This paper is a complement to our previous paper in the same journal [1] and presents our criteria for the inqualities in the maximum-minimum theory in a new form. It could be called an invariant formulation of these criteria and therefore may be of some interest. Using the notation of our previous paper let A be a compact, negative definite, symmetric operator on a real Hilbert space H with the scalar product (u, v). Denote by λ_k , $k = 1, 2, \cdots$

$$\lambda_1 \leq \lambda_2 \leq \cdots$$

the eigenvalues and by u_k , $(u_i, u_k) = \delta_{ik}$, the corresponding eigenfunctions (or eigenvectors) of the equation

$$(1) Au = \lambda u.$$

The assumption that A be negative definite is made only for the convenience of ordering the eigenvalues in an increasing sequence. For the case of infinitely many eigenvalues we have $\lambda_k \to 0$. Let $2 \le m \le n$ where m is such that

(2)
$$\lambda_{m-1} < \lambda_m = \lambda_{m+1} = \cdots = \lambda_n \le \lambda_{n+1} \le \cdots.$$

Let p_1 , p_2 , \cdots , p_{n-1} be any n-1 elements in H and denote by R(u) the Rayleigh quotient R(u) = (Au, u)/(u, u). Let us consider

(3)
$$\lambda(p_1, p_2, \cdots, p_{n-1}) = \min R(u)$$

under the n-1 orthogonality conditions

(4)
$$(u, p_1) = (u, p_2) = \cdots = (u, p_{n-1}) = 0.$$

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
