On the Inversion of Toeplitz Operators

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1. Introduction. Let m denote the normalized Haar measure on the circle group T. For $1 \leq p \leq \infty$, L^p will denote the usual (complex) Lebesgue space of this measure space. The closed subspace of L^p consisting of all functions whose Fourier coefficients vanish on the negative integers will be denoted by H^p . For $g \in L^\infty$, the Toeplitz operator T_p is an operator on H^2 (bounded linear transformation of H^2 into itself) defined by

$$T_{g}f = P(gf), \qquad f \in H^{2}$$

where P is the orthogonal projection of L^2 onto H^2 . Widom ([15], [16]) obtained necessary and sufficient conditions on g in order that T_o is an invertible operator *i.e.* a bijective mapping. Independently, Devinatz obtained the inversion theorem in [1]. Devinatz shows that the theorem is valid for H^2 -spaces of Dirichlet algebras. Their final result is the following:

 T_{σ} is invertible if and only if g can be written in the form $\gamma \exp [u + i(v + \tilde{w})]$, where γ is a complex number of modulus 1, u, v, w are real functions in L^{∞} , $||v||_{\infty} < \pi/2$ and \tilde{w} denotes the conjugate function of w.

In this paper we study the problem of invertibility of Toeplitz operators induced by essentially bounded operator valued functions on the H^2 space of functions taking values in a complex separable Hilbert space. We shall show in §4 that an appropriate reformulation of the above result holds in the vectorial case. This reformulation states that T_g is invertible if and only if g can be factored in the form uh where h and h^{-1} are in H^* , u is a function of modulus 1 almost everywhere and there exists an invertible element of H^* whose L^* -distance from u is less than 1. The equivalence of the two statements is a consequence of the formula for outer functions [8, p. 62] and a Lemma of Helson and Szegö [6, p. 126, Lemma 1].

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
