On Nonlinear Singular Perturbation Problems with Interior Nonuniformities

1. Problem Statement. Let us consider certain two-point boundary value problems of the form

(1.1)
$$\begin{cases} \epsilon y^{\prime\prime} = f(x, y, y^{\prime}, \epsilon), & 0 \leq x \leq 1 \\ y(0) = \alpha(\epsilon), & y(1) = \beta(\epsilon), \end{cases}$$

where the "reduced problem"

(1.2)
$$\begin{cases} f(x, z(x), z'(x), 0) = 0, & 0 \le x \le 1 \\ z(0) = \alpha(0), & z(1) = \beta(0), \end{cases}$$

has an "angular solution"

(1.3)
$$z(x) = \begin{cases} g_0(x), & 0 \le x \le x_0 \\ h_0(x), & x_0 \le x \le 1, \end{cases}$$

where

$$g_0(x_0) = h_0(x_0) \equiv y_0$$

and

$$\mu_1 \equiv g_0'(x_0) \neq h_0'(x_0) \equiv \mu_2$$
.

We shall assume that f is infinitely differentiable in all its arguments, that ϵ is a small positive parameter, and that $\alpha(\epsilon)$ and $\beta(\epsilon)$ have prescribed asymptotic expansions, say

(1.4)
$$\alpha(\epsilon) \sim \sum_{i \geq 0} \alpha_i \epsilon^i$$
 and $\beta(\epsilon) \sim \sum_{i \geq 0} \beta_i \epsilon^i$

as $\epsilon \to 0$. Without loss of generality, we shall take $\mu_1 < \mu_2$.
