Interpolating Sequences for Bounded Harmonic Functions

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Introduction. A sequence $\{z_i\}_{i=1}^{\infty}$ in the open unit disc \triangle is an *interpolating sequence* if for every bounded sequence $\{a_i\}_{i=1}^{\infty}$ there is a bounded analytic function f on \triangle such that $f(z_i) = a_i$ for all j. If for every such $\{a_i\}_{i=1}^{\infty}$ there is a bounded harmonic function u on \triangle with $u(z_i) = a_i$, we call $\{z_i\}_{i=1}^{\infty}$ a harmonic interpolating sequence. It is clear that every interpolating sequence is a harmonic interpolating sequence. Our purpose here is to prove the converse.

Theorem. Every harmonic interpolating sequence is an interpolating sequence.

The proof uses Hall's lemma and the construction from the proof of the corona theorem given in [2]. The theorem given here had also been proved by Carleson by similar means (unpublished).

§1. Two elementary lemmas. Fix a harmonic interpolating sequence $\{z_i\}_{i=1}^{\infty}$.

Lemma 1. There are constants M > 1 and $\eta = \eta(M) > 0$ such that

(1)
$$\left|\frac{z_j-z_k}{1-\bar{z}_kz_j}\right| \geq \eta \quad \text{if} \quad j \neq k,$$

(2) If $|a_i| \leq 1$ for all j, there is u harmonic with $u(z_i) = a_i$ and $||u|| = \sup |u(z)| \leq M$.

Proof. The open mapping theorem for Banach spaces gives (2), and (1) is an easy consequence of (2). Indeed, let u be real and harmonic with $u(z_k) = 0$, $u(z_i) = 1$, $||u|| \le M$. If v is the conjugate harmonic function vanishing at z_k , then $f(z) = e^{u+iv} - 1$ satisfies $f(z_k) = 0$, $|f(z_i)| \ge e - 1$, and $||f|| \le e^M + 1$. By Schwarz's lemma,

$$\left|\frac{z_i-z_k}{1-\bar{z}_kz_i}\right| \ge \frac{|f(z_i)|}{e^M+1} \ge \frac{e-1}{e^M+1}.$$

For any sequence $\{z_i\}_{i=1}^{\infty}$ in \triangle , let μ be the measure with mass $1-|z_i|^2$ at z_i . Function theoretic properties of $\{z_i\}_{i=1}^{\infty}$ can often be expressed in terms of μ .
