## The Strong Szegö Limit Theorem for Circular Arcs

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The strong Szegö limit theorem states that if f is a positive function on the unit circle whose derivative satisfies a Lipschitz condition (these conditions have been considerably relaxed in recent years) and  $D_n[f]$  is the Toeplitz determinant

$$\det\left(\frac{1}{2\pi}\int_0^{2\pi}e^{i(j-k)\theta}f(\theta)\ d\theta\right), \qquad j, k=0, \cdots, n-1,$$

then as  $n \to \infty$  one has the asymptotic formula

$$D_n[f] \sim E[f]G[f]^n$$

where, if

$$\log f(\theta) \sim \sum_{k=-\infty}^{\infty} f_k e^{ik\theta},$$

one defines

$$G[f] = \exp f_0$$
,  $E[f] = \exp \frac{1}{4} \sum_{k=1}^{\infty} k f_k f_{-k}$ .

The analogue of this is obtained here for a function f which satisfies  $f(\theta) = f(2\pi - \theta)$ , which is supported on a closed arc  $\alpha \le \theta \le 2\pi - \alpha$ , and which when restricted to that arc is positive and has derivative satisfying a Lipschitz condition with exponent greater than 1/2 (these conditions also can be relaxed). The formula reads

$$D_n[f] \sim 2^{1/12} e^{3\xi'(-1)} \left( \sin \frac{\alpha}{2} \right)^{-1/4} E[F]^2 n^{-1/4} G[F]^n \left( \cos \frac{\alpha}{2} \right)^{n^2}$$

where E and G have the same meanings as before and

$$F(\theta) = f\left(2 \cos^{-1} \cos \frac{\alpha}{2} \cos \theta\right).$$

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
