Between Barreled and W-Barreled for C(X)

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1. For a completely regular Hausdorff space X, let C(X) be the set of continuous real-valued functions on X, with the compact-open topology. A basis for this topology is given by $\{N(K, \epsilon, f): K \subset X \text{ is compact, } \epsilon > 0, f \epsilon C(X)\}$, where $N(K, \epsilon, f) = \{g \epsilon C(X): |f(t) - g(t)| \le \epsilon \text{ for all } t \epsilon K\}$.

In 1954 L. Nachbin and T. Shirota proved independently that C(X) is barreled if and only if given any closed, non-compact subset F of X there exists $f \in C(X)$ which is unbounded on F[2, 3].

A space with this property will be referred to as an N-S space.

Wilansky has defined a linear topological space to be W-barreled if every closed, absorbing subset has non-empty interior [5, p. 224]. The purpose of this paper is to give a condition on X which is between C(X) barreled and C(X) W-barreled. In Section 2 we define the term L-W space, show that if X is an L-W space, C(X) is barreled, show that if C(X) is W-barreled, X is an X-Y space, and give an example of a space X which is not an X-Y space for which X is barreled. In Section 3 we study almost-discrete spaces in order to give an example of a space X which is an X-Y space but for which X is not X-barreled. In Section 4 we introduce the concept of the center of a subset of X-barreled. In Section 4 we introduce the concept of the center of a subset of X-barrels.

- 2. The main result in this section is Theorem 2.6 which gives a necessary condition on X for C(X) to be W-barreled.
- **Definition 2.1.** A topological space X is said to be an L-W space if for every decreasing sequence of closed, non-compact subsets $\{F_n\}$ of X for which $\bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} \{F_n\} \neq \emptyset$, there exists f in C(X) unbounded on each F_n .

Clearly, C(X) is barreled whenever X is an L-W space.

Theorem 2.2. If C(X) is category II, then X satisfies the stronger condition that for every decreasing sequence $\{F_n\}$ of closed, non-compact, non-empty subsets of X there exists f in C(X) unbounded on each F_n .

Proof. For each n, let $A_n = \{f \in C(X): |f(t)| \le n \text{ for all } t \in F_n\}$. Clearly
