## Thinness and Wiener Criteria for Non-linear Potentials

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This paper is dedicated to Eberhard Hopf on the occasion of his seventieth birthday.

Introduction. In this work we will discuss the theory of thin sets relative to non-linear potentials of the form  $u_{\mu} = k * (k * \mu)^{1/(p-1)}$ . Here k is a kernel on  $\mathbb{R}^n$ , which, among other things, is radial and non-increasing in |x|,  $\mu$  is a positive Radon measure and 1 . Such potentials play a prominent role in the capacity theory of linear potentials <math>k \* f, where f is a function in the Lebesgue class  $\mathfrak{L}_p$ ; see [7] and [8]. The continuity properties of the two kinds of potentials are closely tied, so that the theory of thin sets for the non-linear potential gives important information concerning the continuity of the linear potential. For a discussion of this see [6].

We distinguish two classes of non-linear potentials,  $\mathcal{O}_{k,p}$  and  $\mathfrak{F}_{k,p}$ . The first class contains more or less all potentials of interest, while the second is the subclass consisting of bounded potentials. We consider thinness relative to these two classes. If  $E \subset \mathbf{R}^n$  and  $x_0 \notin E$  we say that E is  $\mathcal{O}_{k,p}$ -thin at  $x_0$ , if  $x_0 \notin \overline{E}$  or there exists  $u = u_\mu \in \mathcal{O}_{k,p}$  such that

$$u(x_0) < \liminf_{\substack{x \to x_0 \\ x \in E}} u(x).$$

 $\mathfrak{F}_{k,p}$ -thinness is defined in the same way except that  $u \in \mathfrak{F}_{k,p}$ .

Our principal concern is the Wiener Criterion for thinness. Here we impose the restriction that in the neighborhood of 0, k(x) be comparable to a kernel  $|x|^{\alpha-n}$ ,  $0 < \alpha < n$ . Further, we need consider only the case  $\alpha p \leq n$ , since, in the contrary case, the potentials are continuous functions. Pointwise upper and lower bounds for the non-linear potential, discussed at length in Section 3, play a crucial role. We will outline some of these results in rough form. Let  $v(x_0, r) = \int_{\{|x-x_0| < r\}} d\mu(x)$ . In all cases, 1 , we get the lower bound,

$$Q \int_0^{r_0} (r^{\alpha p-n} v(x_0, r))^{1/(p-1)} \frac{dr}{r} \leq u(x_0),$$

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
