Estimates for Fully Developed Shock Solutions to the Equation

$$\frac{\partial u}{\partial t} - \frac{\partial v}{\partial x} = 0$$
 and $\frac{\partial v}{\partial t} - \frac{\partial \sigma(u)}{\partial x} = 0$

1. Introduction. Greenberg [1] recently announced a global existence theorem for the quasi-linear wave equation:

$$(1.1) \quad \frac{\partial u}{\partial t} - \frac{\partial v}{\partial x} = 0 \quad \text{and} \quad \frac{\partial v}{\partial t} - \frac{\partial \sigma(u)}{\partial x} = 0, \qquad -\infty < x < \infty \quad \text{and} \quad t > 0.$$

Subsequently, it was learned that Bakvalov [2] obtained a similar result. The Greenberg Theorem was

Theorem 1. Suppose σ is smooth and satisfies

$$\sigma'(u) > 0, \, \sigma''(u) < 0, \lim_{u \to \infty} \int_{1}^{u} (\sigma'(s))^{1/2} \, ds = \infty$$

and

(1.2)
$$(\sigma'(w))^{1/2} (\sigma'(u))^{1/2} \ge \frac{\sigma(w) - \sigma(u)}{w - u}$$

for all 0 < u < w. Then, if u_0 and v_0 are bounded measurable functions which are of locally bounded variation and satisfy

(1.3)
$$\lim_{u \to 0^{+}} \int_{1}^{u} (\sigma'(s))^{1/2} ds < q$$

$$= \frac{1}{2} \left[\inf_{x} \left(v_{0}(x) + \int_{1}^{u_{0}(x)} (\sigma'(s))^{1/2} ds \right) - \sup_{x} \left(v_{0}(x) - \int_{1}^{u_{0}(x)} (\sigma'(s))^{1/2} ds \right) \right]$$

the initial value problem (1.1) together with the initial condition

(1.4)
$$\lim_{t \to 0^+} (u, v)(x, t) = (u_0, v_0)(x), \quad -\infty < x < \infty,$$
