Existence and Uniqueness of Positive Eigenfunctions for a Class of Quasilinear Elliptic Boundary Value Problems of Sublinear Type

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1. Following the classification which appears to have been introduced by Pimbley [14], [15], one calls the semi-linear boundary value problem

(1.1)
$$Lu = f(x, u), \qquad x \in \Omega,$$

$$(1.2) Mu = 0, x \varepsilon \partial \Omega,$$

sublinear if the linear operator $\mathfrak L$ determined by L and the boundary conditions (1.2) has, in some sense, a positive inverse and $0 < uf(x, tu) \leq tuf(x, u)$ for $x \in \Omega$, $u \neq 0$ and $t \geq 1$; the problem is called superlinear if $\mathfrak L$ is the same and $0 < uf(x, tu) \leq tuf(x, u)$ for $x \in \Omega$, $u \neq 0$, and 0 < t < 1.

If the operator \mathcal{L} has a positive Green's function, so that (1.1)–(1.2) is equivalent to an integral equation

$$u(x) = \int_{\Omega} G(x, t) f(t, u(t)) dt,$$

then in the sublinear case one can expect uniqueness of the positive solution, i.e., that (1.1)-(1.2) can have at most one solution which is positive in Ω . For the second order ordinary differential equation with zero end conditions such a result was proved by Picard [13]. (For this case the uniqueness proof reduces to showing that there is never a conjugate point in the interior of the interval. For the superlinear case, (see the discussion in [7]) the question of the uniqueness of a positive solution is a more subtle one.) In [17] Urysohn proved uniqueness of a positive solution for a sublinear case of the equation bearing his name, i.e.,

$$u(x) = \int_{\Omega} K(x, t; u(t)) dt.$$

Urysohn's result was abstracted and generalized by Krasnosel'skii and Lady-1017

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
