A New Example of a Jacobson Radical Simple Ring

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For a number of years, one of the outstanding problems in radical theory was the existence of a Jacobson radical simple ring. E. Sasiada announced the existence of such a ring around 1961, and he and P. M. Cohn published the example in 1967 [3]. While Sasiada invented a ring with the desired properties, this paper presents a new example which is a homomorphic image of an ideal of the algebra B(H) of operators on a separable infinite dimensional Hilbert space H.

All the necessary background material is contained in "Semiprime Ideals and Irreducible Ideals of the Ring of Bounded Operators on Hilbert Space" by D. Morris and N. Salinas [2]. The first theorem below comes directly from that paper.

Theorem. If I is an ideal of B(H), then I is semiprime iff $I = I^p$ where p is any positive number not equal to one.

Theorem. Let A be a compact, positive, diagonal operator which is not of finite rank. Suppose that the ideal $\langle A \rangle$ generated by A is semiprime. Then there exists an ideal M maximal with respect to missing $\{A^n; n = 1, 2, \cdots\}$. Furthermore, B(H)/M is subdirectly irreducible with idempotent heart.

Proof. M exists by Zorn's lemma since the ideal of finite rank operators misses $\{A^n\}$. If $M \subset K$, an ideal of B(H), then there is an n so that $A^n \in K$. Hence, by the theorem above, $\langle A \rangle = \langle A \rangle^n = \langle A^n \rangle \subset K$. Therefore $A \in K$ and $\{K; K \supset M\}$, so B(H)/M is subdirectly irreducible. Also, since M is automatically prime, the heart G/M is idempotent.

The example now follows easily. If C denotes the compact operators, and F the operators of finite rank, it follows that C/F is Jacobson radical since, by a theorem of Kaplansky [1], C is the only non-zero primitive ideal of B(H). Therefore, $(C/F)/(M/F) \cong C/M$ is Jacobson radical. Also, C/M is subdirectly
