On Semi-Coercive Nonlinear Problems

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Introduction. In this note we investigate the solvability of nonlinear equations and inequalities in case the usual coerciveness assumption (which, in some sense, guarantees that the problem is always solvable) is replaced by the weaker condition of semi-coerciveness, i.e. coerciveness only with respect to a seminorm. Problems of this kind were previously considered by Fichera [4], Lions-Stampacchia [7], Browder [3] and Schatzman [8]. Their approach is essentially based on a direct decomposition of the basic space involved, and on a projection argument. This procedure is rather complicated and unnatural, especially for nonlinear operators. It is our aim to present a simple and transparent method which, roughly speaking, shows that semi-coercive problems are solved only in cases in which they are actually coercive ones.

The abstract results are given in Section 1. Section 2 contains two new applications to nonlinear elliptic boundary value problems.

Section 1. Let V be a real reflexive Banach space with norm $||\cdot||_V$ and dual V^* , and let (f, u) denote the duality pairing between $f \in V^*$ and $u \in V$. Strong and weak convergence are expressed by the symbols " \rightarrow " and " \rightarrow ", respectively.

Definition. The mapping $T: V \to V^*$ is pseudo-monotone provided

- (i) T is continuous from finite-dimensional subspaces of V to the weak topology on V^* ;
- (ii) if $\{u_n\}$ is a sequence in V such that $u_n \rightarrow u$ and $\lim \sup (Tu_n, u_n u) \leq 0$, then

$$(Tu, u - v) \leq \lim \inf (Tu_n, u_n - v) \text{ for all } v \in V.$$

Let further $\varphi: V \to (-\infty, +\infty]$ be a convex, lower semicontinuous function with $\varphi(0) = 0$. For given $f \in V^*$ we are concerned with the problem of finding $u \in V$ such that

$$(1.1) (Tu - f, v - u) + \varphi(v) - \varphi(u) > 0 \text{ for all } v \in V.$$

A criterion for solvability of (1.1) is given by the following
