Special Cohomology and Branched Coverings

1. Introduction. A branched covering is a light open map $f: M \to N$ for which there exists a set B_f (the branch set) such that $f \mid (M - B_f)$ is a covering projection onto $(N - fB_f)$. If $f \mid f^{-1}fB_f$ is a homeomorphism onto fB_f , the map is called a Montgomery-Samelson (M-S) covering. We will consider only the case in which M and N are compact connected n-manifolds. In this case dim $B_{\ell} \leq$ n-2 [1] and $f \mid (M-B_t)$ is a finite-to-one map. A special homology theory has recently been used to study M-S coverings [4, 7, 8, 9]. The construction in [7] which is the cornerstone of this work is not valid in the generality there claimed. It is valid for orbit maps of semifree finite group actions with tamely embedded branch set images. Such maps are called tame regular M-S coverings and constitute an important class of branched coverings. In this paper we construct a special homology and cohomology for regular M-S coverings. We specialize the Fáry spectral sequence to this situation and make a few applications. We investigate M-S coverings on spheres, lens spaces and some spheres with handles. We also consider branched coverings on S^3 and some flat manifolds.

Throughout this paper, degree means geometric degree 2. The major tools. [2]. We will use degree to mean integral degree and absolute degree whenever they coincide with geometric degree without explicit mention of this fact.

Theorem 1. Let G be a finite group acting semi-freely on the n-manifold M. Let the orbit space N be a manifold and let $f: M \to N$ denote the orbit map and B_f its branch set. If fB_f is tamely embedded and not empty, then G is \mathbf{Z}_d . Therefore, Smith theory implies that for each prime p dividing d there exist graded vector spaces $H_*^{\rho}(M)$, $H_*^{\rho}(M, B_f)(\rho = \sigma, \tau)$ such that

- (1) $H_*^{\rho}(M) = H_*^{\rho}(M, B_f) \oplus H_*(B_f)$ (2) $H_*^{\tau}(M, B_f) = H_*(N, fB_f)$
