## Some Third Order Initial Value Problems Arising in Magnetohydrodynamics

1. Introduction. In this article, we discuss the asymptotic behavior of two third order nonlinear initial value problems that arise in an investigation of a nonlinear, resistive hydromagnetic boundary layer in an inviscid rotating fluid.

A complete derivation of the third order nonlinear differential equation and the initial conditions is presented in Section 2. There, the Navier-Stokes equations, which are coupled with Maxwell's equation to describe the fluid flow and the magnetic fields, are reduced to the initial value problems

$$s''' + 3ss'' + \frac{1}{2}(s')^2 + 2s^2s' = 0, \quad ' = d/dt$$
  
 $s(0) = s''(0) = 0, \quad s'(0) = \pm 2.$ 

The purpose of this paper is to study these and related problems.

The outline of the remainder of the paper and the nature of our results are now indicated. Section 3 establishes that the solution of the initial value problem with a positive initial slope is bounded and monotone increasing. It, therefore, approaches a positive constant as t approaches infinity and, as such, demonstrates a boundary layer character. In Section 4, the initial value problem with a negative initial slope is considered. It is shown that the solution of this initial value problem has one zero on  $(0, \infty)$ ; then, after this zero, the solution is positive and monotone increasing. The solution is bounded and, hence, it also exhibits a boundary layer character. Numerical solutions of the above initial value problems are presented in Section 2 following the derivation of the third order equation. These computations were helpful guides for developing the analysis given in the paper.

In Section 5 we investigate the asymptotic behavior of the solutions of a class of initial value problems associated with the third order differential equation. In general, it is shown that the solutions of initial value problems in this class have a behavior similar to the two physically important problems mentioned above; that is, as t approaches infinity, they approach constants.
