## Homomorphisms of $L^{\infty}$ (G) and Liftings

## I. Introduction.

1.1. We will show a close connection between the subject of liftings of Haar measurable functions on a locally compact group and some recently defined functions arising from taking complex homomorphisms of the translates of essentially bounded functions.

Let G denote throughout an infinite locally compact group. The algebra of all bounded measurable complex functions defined on G, modulo those that vanish a.e. with respect to left Haar measure m, will be denoted by  $L^{\infty}(G)$ , or simply by  $L^{\infty}$ . The norm  $||f||_{\infty}$  of a function f in  $L^{\infty}$  is the essential supremum of |f|. The algebra of all bounded measurable complex functions everywhere defined on G will be denoted by  $M^{\infty}(G)$ . The norm (still symbolized  $||f||_{\infty}$ ) in  $M^{\infty}(G)$  is the supremum of the values of |f|. As usual the space of all complex measurable functions f on G such that the integral of |f| with respect to m is finite is denoted by  $L^{1}(G)$ .

A Haar measurable set A in a locally compact group G is said to be locally null if  $m(K \cap A) = 0$  for every compact  $K \subseteq A$ . In the sequel the statement that a property holds for almost all  $x \in G$  (a.e.) shall mean that the set where it fails is locally null. We shall write  $f \equiv g$  if f = g a.e. and  $A \equiv B$  if the characteristic functions of A and B are equal a.e.

Properly speaking, a function f in  $L^{\infty}$  is the equivalence class of functions everywhere defined on G and equal to f a.e. John von Neumann showed that in the case of G equal to the unit interval it is possible to select exactly one function from each of the equivalence classes in such a way that the selection is algebraic, i.e. is linear and products of selected functions are precisely those functions selected from the product of the equivalence classes. D. Maharam [2] and subsequently A. I. Tulcea and C. I. Tulcea [7] generalized von Neumann's result to various contexts.

**1.2.** To be precise, a mapping  $\rho: M^{\infty}(G) \to M^{\infty}(G)$  is called a *lifting* if the following axioms are satisfied.
