## Erratum: The Converse to the Fixed Point Theorem of P. A. Smith: II, Vol. 22 (1972), 309-325

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Theorem B on page 322 of Reference [2] is not true. In fact R. Schultz has proved the following result (see reference [3]).

**Theorem** (Schultz). For p an odd prime, suppose  $\mathbb{Z}_p$  acts smoothly on a closed  $\mathbb{Z}_p$ -homology sphere  $M^{2n}$  with fixed point set  $F^{2r}(\dim(F^{2r})) = 2r$ ,  $\dim(M^{2n}) = 2n$ ). Let  $\tau \sim \bigoplus_{i=1}^{r} \tau_i$  denote the equivariant normal bundle split into its complex factors as described in no. 3 of p. 309 of [2]. If either p = 3, 5, 7 or  $r > 2 \log_2(p) - 1$ , then the rational Chern classes of each bundle  $\tau_i$  are all trivial.

I am also unable to prove Theorem A on p. 321 in [2]. But that theorem is a corollary of Schultz's theorem if (in the notation of Theorem A [2]) n has an odd prime divisor p satisfying p = 3, 5, 7 or dim  $(F_r) > 2 \log_2(p) - 1$ .

The mistakes and shortcomings I have just described appear as calculational errors in Lemmas 5.1, 5.2 and Theorem 5.5 of [2].

If G = SO(d) (i.e. the case of involutions), then 5.1 and 5.2 are correctly stated and proved in [2]. In Theorem 5.5 the hypothesis has been stated only for  $G \neq SO(d)$ . A correct statement of Theorem 5.5 for G = SO(d) is gotten by replacing the inequality  $m < 2d_i + d(G) - 5$  by the inequality m < 2d(G) - 5, and setting  $F_{m+1} = F_m = 0$ .

For the case of  $\mathbb{Z}_n$ -actions, where n equals a power of 2, I do not know the correct calculations that should appear in 5.1, 5.2, 5.5 of [2].

Now I shall consider separately the corrections to be made for 5.1, 5.2, 5.5 in the case of  $\mathbf{Z}_n$ -actions where n has an odd prime divisor p.

In Lemma 5.1 a third hypothesis must be added: p = 3, 5, 7 or  $m - d(G) + 1 > 2 \log_2(p) - 1$ . Now the correct calculation for
