## The Capacitor Problem

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Let  $\Omega$  be a bounded domain in  $\mathbb{R}^3$  whose boundary  $\Gamma$  is  $C^{\infty}$  and connected. Suppose R is an open subregion of  $\Omega$  which can be written in the form

$$(1) R = \Omega \sim K,$$

where K is a compact subset of  $\Omega$ . For such open sets we define

$$(2) V_R(x) = \int_R \frac{dy}{|x - y|},$$

the electrostatic potential produced by a charge of unit density distributed over R. In this paper we consider the following free boundary value problem: Given a real number q satisfying  $0 < q < m(\Omega)$ , the volume of  $\Omega$ , find a region R of the form (1) with m(R) = q such that

(3) 
$$V_R$$
 is constant on  $\partial K$ .

Specifically, we prove that providing q is sufficiently small, there is a region R with m(R) = q which satisfies (3) such that  $\partial K$ , the inner boundary of R, is a surface of class  $C^{\infty}$  which is diffeomorphic to  $\Gamma$ . Moreover we show that the inner boundary varies smoothly with q.

The problem was encountered by Lieb and Lebowitz [5] in their study of the thermodynamic limit in statistical mechanics of systems that have a net electrical charge. It may also be formulated variationally—the solution region R minimizes the electrostatic potential energy,

$$E = \int_{\mathbb{R}} dx \int_{\mathbb{R}} dy \frac{1}{|x - y|},$$

among all measurable subsets of  $\Omega$  subject to the constraint that m(R) = q. Using the variational approach Wils [9] proved the existence and uniqueness of the region R, but was not able to obtain any information about its regularity. We base our work on (3) directly: we formulate (3) as a non-linear functional equation and we solve the resulting equation with an implicit function theorem (see for example [6]). We could also obtain a uniqueness theorem from our
