## Nonlinear Ordinary and Functional Sturm-Liouville Problems

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1. Introduction. In this paper we study the equation

(1) 
$$L_{\lambda}u = \lambda F(\lambda, u), \qquad u(0) = u(1) = 0,$$

where  $L_{\lambda}$  is a Sturm-Liouville operator depending on the parameter  $\lambda$ , and F is some nonlinear operator. We obtain results covering the existence of continua of positive solutions  $(\lambda, u)$  of (1). By imposing various growth conditions on F we obtain results about the behavior of these continua for large and small values of  $\lambda$  and ||u||. These results are related to work done by G. H. Pimbley, P. H. Rabinowitz, R. E. L. Turner and others (see e.g. [6], [7], [8], [9]). When dealing with nonlinear problems of this type one usually assumes one of two conditions. One condition is that F is strictly positive, in which case  $(\lambda, 0)$  is not a solution for  $\lambda = 1$ . We make a similar assumption in section 2. An alternate condition is that  $F(\lambda, \cdot)$  can be linearized at u = 0. Here, in section 3, we examine instead, the case in which  $F(\lambda, u) \sim u^{\beta}$ ,  $\beta \neq 1$ , for small u. Problems with nonlinearities of this type have been studies by Z. Nehari, G. B. Gustafson and K. Schmitt (see e.g. [5], [1]).

Our results do ultimately depend on the Leray-Schauder theory, however we do not make explicit use of it.

Many of our results carry through under more general boundary conditions and more general conditions on F.

## 2. Preliminaries.

2.1 Notation. Consider the two point boundary value problem

(2) 
$$\begin{cases} L_{\lambda}u \equiv -(p(\lambda, x)u')' + q(\lambda, x)u = \lambda F(\lambda, u), \\ u(0) = u(1) = 0, \end{cases}$$

where p is a positive continuous function on  $[0, \infty) \times [0, 1]$ ,

$$p'(\lambda, x) \equiv \partial p(\lambda, x)/\partial x$$

is continuous, q is a continuous nonnegative function on  $[0, \infty) \times [0, 1]$ , and F is a continuous, bounded (i.e., takes bounded sets to bounded sets) map
