R-Operators II.

On the Approximation of Certain Operator-Valued Analytic Functions and the Hermitian Moment Problem

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I. Introduction.

Origins and statement of the problem. Let \mathcal{K} be a complex separable Hilbert space and let $B(\mathcal{K})$ be the set of all bounded operators on \mathcal{K} . An R-operator, T(z), is a $B(\mathcal{K})$ -valued function which is analytic in the upper and lower half-planes and which satisfies

$$\operatorname{Im} z \cdot \operatorname{Im} T(z) \geq 0.$$

The set of all R-operators will be denoted by W. R-operators are characterized by the

Representation Theorem 1.1. If $T(z) \in \mathbb{W}$, then there is a non-negative operator A, an Hermitian operator B and an increasing strongly additive, positive, operator-valued measure. $\nu(\cdot)$, defined on the Borel sets of $(-\infty, \infty)$ such that

(1.1)
$$T(z) = Az + B + \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} \frac{tz+1}{t-z} d\nu(t).$$

Moreover, if T(z) is analytic over some interval of the real axis, then $\nu(t)$ is constant on this interval and Im T=0. Finally, $\nu(\cdot)$ is uniquely determined by T(z).

Proof. See Allen and Narcowich, [3], Theorems 2.1 and 2.3.

R-operators arise in conjunction with various aspects of Quantum Mechanics (cf. Allen and Narcowich, [3] and [11]), where the variable z is interpreted as energy or as a coupling constant for some interaction. In the latter case, one is often confronted with the following problem: given that T(z) is an R-operator which is analytic on some interval of the real axis, (-a, 0), as well as in the upper and lower half planes, and given that T(z) is known to have the asymptotic expansion
