WC Functions and the Closed Intersection Property

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In [1] it was shown that if X is any T_3 space and A any compact subset of WX then $A \cap X$ is closed in X (i.e. that X has the closed intersection property) and that any Wallman extendible function having a T_3 range is a WO function (see [4]). In [2] was demonstrated the existence of nonregular Hausdorff spaces having the closed intersection property. In this paper it will be shown that in fact any Wallman extendible function whose range has the closed intersection property must have a closed Wallman extension, and thus must be a WC function (see [3]).

Recall that for any T_1 space X the Wallman compactification WX is the collection $\{u:u \text{ is an ultrafilter in the lattice of all closed subsets of }X\}$ with the topology generated by $\{c(A) = \{u \in WX : A \in u\} : A \text{ is a closed subset of }X\}$ as a base for the closed sets. The Wallman compactification WX is a compact T_1 space and the function $\varphi_X: X \to WX$ defined by $\varphi_X(x) = \{A : A \text{ is a closed subset of }X \text{ and }x \in A\}$ is a dense embedding. A continuous function $g: WX \to WY$ is said to be a Wallman extension of $f: X \to Y$ if $\varphi_Y \circ f = g \circ \varphi_X$. When no ambiguity can result it is common practice to ignore the distinction between a space X and the subspace $\varphi_X[X]$ of WX and to speak of X as a subspace of WX. In [3] Harris shows that if a function $f: X \to Y$ has a closed Wallman extension (i.e. if f is a WC function) then the extension of f is unique. We note also that it is easily shown that if A is a closed subset of X, any compact subset of X containing X contains C(X).

Theorem. If $f: X \to Y$ has a Wallman extension $f^*: WX \to WY$ and if Y has the closed intersection property then f is a WC function.

Proof. Consider first a closed subset A of X. Since f^* is continuous and c(A) is a closed subset of WX, the image $f^*[c(A)]$ is a compact subset of WY, and so $Y \cap f^*[c(A)]$ is a closed subset of Y which clearly contains f[A]. Therefore $f^*[c(A)]$ contains $c(c1_Y(f[A]))$. However $f^{*-1}[c(c1_Y(f[A]))]$ is a closed subset of WX which contains A and therefore c(A). Hence $f^*[c(A)]$ must be equal to $c(c1_Y(f[A]))$, a closed set; so the image under f^* of any basic closed set is closed. Now, for any closed subset G of WX, there is some filter F in the lattice closed
