Operator Algebras of Finite Strict Multiplicity. II

Introduction. This is a supplement to the author's articles [6], [7]. Let $\mathcal{L}(\mathcal{X})$ denote the algebra of all (bounded linear) operators acting on the complex Banach space \mathcal{X} and let \mathcal{A} be a weakly closed, identity containing) subalgebra of $\mathcal{L}(\mathcal{X})$; the *strict multiplicity* $\bar{\mu}(\mathcal{A})$ of \mathcal{A} is the infimum of all cardinal numbers $\mathbf{c}(\Gamma)$ taken over all the subsets $\Gamma \subset \mathcal{X}$ such that $\mathcal{A}(\Gamma) = (\text{definition})$ linear span $\{Ax : A \in \mathcal{A}, x \in \Gamma\}$ coincides with \mathcal{X} . If $\bar{\mu}(\mathcal{A}) < \infty$, we shall say that \mathcal{A} is an algebra of finite strict multiplicity (a.f.s.m.). In particular, \mathcal{A} is called strictly cyclic if $\bar{\mu}(\mathcal{A}) = 1$, i.e., whenever $\mathcal{X} = \mathcal{A}(\{x_0\})$ for a suitable (strictly cyclic) vector x_0 ; if, moreover, $Ax_0 = 0$, $A \in \mathcal{A}$ implies that A = 0, then we shall say that x_0 separates points of \mathcal{A} .

As in [9], the four weakly closed algebras naturally associated with an operator $T \in \mathcal{L}(\mathcal{X})$ will be denoted by $\mathcal{A}(T)$, $\mathcal{A}^a(T)$, $\mathcal{A}'(T)$ and $\mathcal{A}'(T)$ (the algebra generated by the polynomials in T, the algebra generated by the rational functions in T with poles outside the spectrum $\sigma(T)$ of T, the commutant and the double commutant, respectively). We shall say that T is strictly cyclic if $\mathcal{A}(T)$ is so.

The notation, etc., follows in every sense that of [7] and this article will be used as a general reference throughout the paper. Also, we number the sections and results of the present paper following the numbering of [7]. In the first part (§ 7) the following problem is considered: What can be said about the point spectra $\sigma_p(T)$, $\sigma_p(T^*)$ of T and its adjoint T^* if one of the algebras associated with T has finite strict multiplicity? If $\mathcal{A}''(T)$ is a strictly cyclic algebra, what can be said about its Gelfand spectrum and its relation with $\sigma(T)$?

The second part deals with quasisimilarity and invariant subspaces. Among other results it is shown that an operator A quasisimilar to a T such that $\bar{\mu}(\mathscr{L}'(T)) < \infty$ is necessarily similar to T. The paper includes many examples showing that the results contained here (and several related results) are essentially sharp. Indeed, the counterexamples are more important than the positive results. As usual, subspace will always denote a closed linear manifold.
