A Free Boundary Problem: The Flow of Two Immiscible Fluids in a One-Dimensional Porous Medium II

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1. Introduction. In this paper we continue an investigation, begun in [5], of the free boundary problem:

Here T > 0, $1 > s_0 > 0$, a > 0, and b > 0 are given constants; f_1, f_2 , and u_0 are given functions; and the unknowns are s(t) and u(x, t). (The superscripts $^+$ and $^-$ denote the limits from the right and left respectively for the space variable x.)

Equations (1.1)–(1.6) form a simplified model for the behavior of two slightly compressible, immiscible fluids within a porous medium. The function u(x, t) represents the fluid pressure, and s(t) is the point of contact between the two liquids at time $t \ge 0$. Conditions (1.3) and (1.4) are assumptions that both the pressures and velocities of the fluids are continuous across the interface; (1.6) is the observation that the rate of change of s(t) is the common velocity of the liquids at that point.

The author's previous paper [5] on problem (1.1)–(1.6) was devoted primarily to establishing a *local* existence theorem. We proved that there exists some T > 0, depending on the H^1 -norm of the initial data u_0 , such that (1.1)–(1.6) has at least one solution $\{u(x, t), s(t)\}$ for $0 \le t \le T$. The techniques of [5] were not,
