P. A. Smith-theoretic Algebro-geometric Invariants of Compact Differentiable Manifolds

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§1. The notion of algebraic deficiency. Let M^n be a compact differentiable manifold. By a theorem of Nash which extended a theorem of Seifert and which was completed by Tognoli (cf. [N], [S] and [T]), there exists an algebraic variety XX defined over IR such that $M = X_{\mathbb{R}}$. The original proof gives an XX which is affine. But it may be shown further that one may choose XX either affine or projective which is moreover nonsingular and also $X_{\mathbb{C}}$ can be embedded in \mathbb{C}_{2n+1} or $\mathbb{P}_{2n+1}(\mathbb{C})$ so that $\mathbb{X}_{\mathbb{C}}$ is invariant under the canonical conjugation $z \xrightarrow{\sigma} \bar{z}$ where z stands for an affine or projective co-ordinate system and σ restricted to X coincides with the canonical conjugation defined by the Rvariety structure of X cf. [K]. A nonsingular X will be called an affine respectively projective complexification of M according to whether X is affine or projective. The choice of X is not unique so it is natural to ask for X which is "minimal" in some sense. One such notion suitable for the affine case was investigated in [K]. Here I shall consider a notion which is suitable for the projective case. It is motivated by the P. A. Smith theory in the case of involutions.

We need only the following special case of the P. A. Smith theory. Let X be a finite complex with involution τ , *i.e.* a homeomorphism $\tau: X \to X$ with $\tau^2 = 1$. Let M be the fixed point set of τ . Let $H^*(A)$ denote the total cohomology module of a space A with Z_2 -coefficients and $h^*(A)$ the dimension of $H^*(A)$ over Z_2 . The Smith theory asserts that $h^*(X) - h^*(M)$ is an even nonnegative integer (cf. Bredon [B], Chapter 3 §4).

We apply this to the following situation. Let $X_n(1)$ be a complex manifold, $\tau: X \to X$ a conjugation, i.e. an antiholomorphic involution, and M = the fixed point set of τ . Then M is either empty or an n-dimensional differentiable manifold. If M is nonempty we call X a complexification of M. (The previously defined affine or projective complexification of a differentiable manifold is clearly a complexification in the new sense.)
