Hyperinvariant Subspaces of C_{11} Contractions, II

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For a bounded linear operator T acting on a complex, §1. Introduction. separable Hilbert space, let Lat T and Hyperlat T denote its invariant subspace lattice and its hyperinvariant subspace lattice, respectively. In [6], we investigated Hyperlat T when T is a completely non-unitary C_{11} contraction with finite defect indices. We showed that for such contractions Hyperlat T is preserved, as a lattice, under quasi-similarity. We continue our investigation in this paper. For the contraction considered we give an explicit description of the elements in Hyperlat T in terms of the characteristic function and the functional model of T (Theorem 3.5). If T is also multiplicity-free, by combining with a result of Clark [1] we obtain a complete description of the elements in Lat T (Theorem 4.1). Our results generalize the corresponding results of Sickler [2] in that he only considered completely non-unitary contractions with outer scalar-valued characteristic functions, which are special cases of the operators we consider here. Indeed, the proof of Theorem 3.5 (comprising Lemmas 3.1-3.4) follows the general outline of Sickler's proof ([2], §4). As applications, Theorem 3.6 says that any element in Hyperlat T is the kernel and the range of some operators in $\{T\}$ ", the double commutant of T, and Theorem 4.3 gives a necessary and sufficient condition that Lat T = Hyperlat T.

The determination of the elements in Hyperlat T for weak contractions will appear in a subsequent paper [7].

In §2 below, we briefly review the background needed for our work. §3 gives the complete description of the elements in Hyperlat T mentioned above. In §4, we restrict our considerations to multiplicity-free C_{11} contractions.

§2. Preliminaries. We follow the notation and the terminology used in [6].

Let \mathbb{C} be the complex plane and let L_n^2 and H_n^2 denote the standard Lebesgue and Hardy spaces of \mathbb{C}^n -valued functions defined on the unit circle C. We use t to denote the argument of a function defined on C. A statement involving t is said to be true if it holds for almost all t with respect to the Lebesgue measure.

Assume that T is a completely non-unitary (c.n.u.) contraction with defect indices $d_T = d_{T^*} \equiv n < \infty$. In the discussion of the following we shall consider
