On the Boundedness of Solutions of Volterra Equations

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1. Introduction and statement of results. The purpose of this paper is to study *a priori* bounds on the solutions of the nonlinear Volterra equation

(1.1)
$$x(t) + \int_0^t a(t-s)g(x(s))ds = f(t), \qquad t \in R_+ = [0, \infty)$$

where a, g and f are prescribed real functions. In [2] (cf. [6]) this question is considered under the assumptions that $f \in C(R_+; R) \cap BV(R_+; R)$, $g \in C(R; R)$, $a: R_+ \to R_+$ is nonincreasing and $m\{x \mid x > 0, g(x) \ge 0\} = m\{x \mid x < 0, g(x) \le 0\} = +\infty$. In [7] the condition on a is weakened to $a \in NBV(R_+; R)$, $Re \int_{R_+} e^{-i\omega t} da(t) \ge 0$ for $\omega \in R$, and the crucial condition on the function g is that $|g(x)| \le k(1 + G(x))$ for some constant k where $G(x) = \int_0^x g(u) du$. Then $\sup_{t \ge 0} |g(x(t))| < \infty$ and if moreover $\lim_{|x| \to \infty} G(x) = +\infty$ then it also follows that $\sup_{t \ge 0} |x(t)| < \infty$.

In Theorems 1, 2 and 3 below we replace the assumption $f \in BV(R_+; R)$ by $f \in L^{\infty}(R_+; R)$, but then we must, of course, assume more of the functions a and g. Our first result is

Theorem 1. Assume that (1.1) holds and that

(1.2) a:
$$R_+ \to R_+$$
 is nonincreasing,

$$(1.3) a \in L^1(R_+; R),$$

$$(1.4) g \in C(R; R),$$

(1.5) there exist constants
$$k_1$$
 and k_2 such that

$$|g(x) - g(y)| \le k_1 |x - y| + k_2, \quad x, y \in R,$$

(1.6) there exists a constant
$$k_3$$
 such that $x > y$ implies $g(x) + k_3 \ge g(y)$

$$(1.7) f \in L^{\infty}(R_+; R),$$

$$(1.8) x \in L_{loc}(R_+; R).$$

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
