Extremal Plurisubharmonic Functions for Certain Domains in \mathbb{C}^2

1. Introduction. We consider the following problem which is related to holomorphic mappings (see [1]) and capacity theory in \mathbb{C}^n (see [6] and [11]). Given smoothly bounded, strongly pseudoconvex domains $\Omega_0 \subset\subset \Omega_1 \subset\subset \mathbb{C}^2$, find $u \in C^2(\bar{\Omega}_1 \setminus \Omega_0)$ such that

u is plurisubharmonic on $\Omega = \Omega_1 \setminus \bar{\Omega}_0$

(1)
$$\det \left(\frac{\partial^2 u}{\partial z_i \partial \bar{z}_j}\right) = 0 \quad \text{on } \Omega$$

$$u = 1 \quad \text{on } \partial \Omega_1$$

$$u = 0 \quad \text{on } \partial \Omega_0.$$

Generalized solutions have been shown to exist (see [4] and [9]), and the generalized solution coincides with the function $u(\zeta) = \sup v(\zeta)$, where the supremum is taken over all v plurisubharmonic on Ω such that $\lim_{\zeta \to \zeta_1} v(\zeta) \le 1$ for $\zeta_1 \in \partial \Omega_1$ and $\lim_{\zeta \to \zeta_0} v(\zeta) \le 0$ for $\zeta_0 \in \partial \Omega_0$. For general domains, it was shown in [2] that there is no solution in $C^2(\bar{\Omega}_1 \setminus \Omega_0)$.

Here we show that the solution of (1) is smooth for certain domains which are small perturbations of the circular annulus $A(R_0, R_1) = \{R_0^2 < |z|^2 + |w|^2 < R_1^2\}$. We consider domains of the form

$$\Omega_{j} = \{(z, w) : \log |w| < \psi^{j}(z), \quad |z| < R_{j}\}, \qquad j = 0, 1$$

$$\psi^{j}(z) = \frac{1}{2} \log (R_{j}^{2} - |z|^{2}) + \varphi^{j}(z)$$

where φ^0 , φ^1 are small. Thus if $\varphi^0 = \varphi^1 = 0$, then $\Omega_1 \setminus \bar{\Omega}_0 = A(R_0, R_1)$. Because of the symmetry in the *w*-variable, we can introduce a free boundary problem with which (1) is reduced to a one-dimensional problem.

To motivate our construction, we describe the nature of the solution of (1) for a domain of the form (2); after the construction, it will be clear that these properties actually hold. If $\partial \bar{\partial} u \neq 0$ then by the Frobenius theorem, the 2-form $\partial \bar{\partial} u$ may be integrated to give a foliation \mathcal{M} , whose leaves are complex sub-
