## Base Spaces

**0.** Introduction. If one writes out all the requirements needed for the homotopy classification of complex vector bundles and for the direct construction of their Chern classes, formulated in terms of the base spaces of the bundles, one reaches a natural category  $\mathcal{B}$  of those spaces which serve as base spaces. The category  $\mathcal{B}$  contains the traditional category  $\mathcal{W}$  of spaces of the homotopy types of CW spaces.

One of the principal features of the category  $\mathcal{B}$  is that it is a natural category in which theorems can be proved by the classical Mayer-Vietoris technique. For example, one uses the Mayer-Vietoris technique to prove the Leray-Hirsch theorem for bundles over spaces in  $\mathcal{B}$ ; the corresponding result for  $\mathcal{W}$  then follows from the inclusion  $\mathcal{W} \subset \mathcal{B}$ .

In §1 we define  $\mathcal{B}$  and establish its principal features, including the "Mayer-Vietoris technique". In §2 we verify the inclusion  $\mathcal{W} \subset \mathcal{B}$ . In §3 we show that  $\mathcal{B}$  (and  $\mathcal{W}$ ) have all the properties needed for the homotopy classification of complex vector bundles and for the direct construction of Chern classes. The remarks of §4 are self-explanatory.

- 1. The category  $\mathcal{B}$ . The category  $\mathcal{B}$  will be defined in two stages, the first being an induction on the natural numbers  $n \geq 0$ . In describing the inductive step we shall suppose in part that a given topological space X can be covered by q families of open sets, for some natural number q > 0, where the sets in each one of the q families will be mutually disjoint; that is, for q unrelated index sets  $B_1, \dots, B_q$  there will be q families  $\{U_{\beta_1}: \beta_1 \in B_1\}, \dots, \{U_{\beta_q}: \beta_q \in B_q\}$  of open sets  $U_{\beta_p} \subset X$  which collectively cover X, and for each fixed  $p \leq q$  the sets in the family  $\{U_{\beta_p}: \beta_p \in B_p\}$  will be disjoint from one another. For notational convenience we let  $\{U_{1,\alpha}\}_{\alpha}, \dots, \{U_{q,\gamma}\}_{\gamma}$  represent the q families of open sets, without explicitly identifying the index sets; for each  $p \leq q$  the notation  $\{U_{p,\beta}\}_{\beta}$  will represent the p<sup>th</sup> family.
- 1.1 Definition. A topological space is of  $0^{th}$  type if it is a disjoint union of contractible spaces. Suppose that a topological space X can be covered by the union of finitely many familes  $\{U_{1,\alpha}\}_{\alpha}, \cdots, \{U_{q,\gamma}\}_{\gamma}$  of open sets  $U_{p,\beta} \subset X$  such that for each  $p \leq q$  the sets  $U_{p,\beta}$  in the family  $\{U_{p,\beta}\}_{\beta}$  are disjoint from one another. Then X is of  $n^{th}$  type whenever there is such a covering with the addi-
