## A Simple Proof of Mehler's Formula for q-Hermite Polynomials

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The q-Hermite polynomials,  $H_n(x|q)$ , |q| < 1, can be defined by their generating function:

(1) 
$$\prod_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{1}{(1-2xrq^n+r^2q^{2n})} = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{H_n(x|q)r^n}{(q)_r},$$

where  $(a)_r = (1 - a)(1 - aq) \dots (1 - aq^{r-1})$ ,  $(a)_0 = 1$ , or by their recurrence relation:

(2) 
$$2xH_n(x|q) = H_{n+1}(x|q) + (1 - q^n)H_{n-1}(x|q),$$
$$H_{-1}(x|q) = 0, \ H_0(x|q) = 1,$$

or by their Fourier expansion:

(3) 
$$H_{n}(\cos\theta|q) = \sum_{k=0}^{n} {n \brack k} \cos(n-2k)\theta$$
$$= \sum_{k=0}^{n} {n \brack k} e^{i(n-2k)\theta},$$

where  $\begin{bmatrix} n \\ k \end{bmatrix}$  is the q-binomial coefficient,

$$\begin{bmatrix} n \\ k \end{bmatrix} = \frac{(q)_n}{(q)_k (q)_{n-k}}.$$

These polynomials have been studied by Rogers [5] [6] [7] [8], Szegö [9], Carlitz [3] [4] and Askey and Ismail [1]. The Rogers-Ramanujan identities first arose in the study of these polynomials (see Rogers [7], Bressoud [2]). The q-Hermite polynomials are also of formal interest, for they have been found to satisfy analogs of many of the formulae known for the Hermite polynomials. Among these is a q-analog of Mehler's formula:
