A Note on Commutators

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Introduction. In this paper we will consider commutators of singular integrals. The commutator operators we consider are of the type [b,L](f)(x) =b(x)Lf(x) - L(bf)(x). L will be the fractional integral operator [6, page 116]. The function b(x) will be a BMO function on \mathbb{R}^n . We shall study the \mathbb{L}^p boundedness properties of these operators and will seek to characterize BMO functions using these operators. Commutators have appeared in [1] and [3]. In [3] using the Fefferman-Stein duality of [4] a factorization of H^1 functions was obtained. To do so BMO commutators were considered and in particular L was taken to be a Calderón-Zygmund operator. To obtain the necessary estimates for fractional integrals we will introduce a generalized version of a maximal operator which appeared in [5]. This maximal function enables us to prove the requisite distributional inequality. A factorization theorem for H^1 involving fractional integrals is readily deducible from our theorem, using the arguments of [3].

Definitions and statement of results. The fractional integral operator I_{α} is defined as

$$I_{\alpha}f(x) = \int_{\mathbb{R}^n} \frac{f(y)}{|x - y|^{n - \alpha}} \, dy, \qquad n \ge 1, \quad 0 < \alpha < n.$$

We denote the Hardy-Littlewood maximal function of f by Mf(x). We also need the maximal function $f_{\alpha,p}^*(x)$.

$$f_{\alpha,p}^*(x) = \sup_{x \in Q} \left(\frac{1}{|Q|^{1-\alpha p/n}} \int_{Q} |f(y)|^p dy \right)^{1/p}$$

where Q is a cube centered at x, sides parallel to the axes. A function $b(y) \in$ $L_{loc}^{1}(\mathbf{R}^{n})$ is said to be in BMO(\mathbf{R}^{n}) if and only if

$$\sup_{Q} \frac{1}{|Q|} \int_{Q} |b(y) - b_{Q}| dy < \infty$$

where $b_Q = (1/|Q|) \int_Q b(y) dy$. The BMO norm of b(y) will be denoted by $||b||_*$ and is given by

$$||b||_* = \sup_{Q} \frac{1}{|Q|} \int_{Q} |b - b_{Q}| dy.$$
