Flatness of Riemannian Metrics Outside Compact Sets

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In a recent article [4], D. Elerath proved the following interesting result: Let M be a complete, open, nonnegatively curved 3-manifold with a point at which all the sectional curvatures are positive; if, in addition, M contains a pole, then it cannot be flat off any compact set. This result poses of course the question of its validity for higher-dimensional manifolds and for other curvature restrictions. We shall show here that higher-dimensional versions are indeed valid, even local ones, also for nonpositively curved manifolds. The method we employ is essentially the same as Elerath's: instead of the Gauss-Bonnet formula, we use the generalized Gauss-Bonnet formula.

As noted by Elerath and the reviewer in MR 80e: 53041, we have counterexamples of the above result in dimension 2: take a circular cone in \mathbb{R}^3 , and replace a neighbourhood of its vertex by a smooth, convex cap. Here is an example, due to L. Nirenberg, of a complete, open, nonpositively curved 2-manifold with points of negative curvature, which is flat off a compact set: take a smooth, convex function y = f(x), defined on \mathbb{R} , with f(0) = 0, f'(0) = 0, f''(0) > 0, which is linear for $|x| \ge 1$. The surface z = f(x) - f(y) in \mathbb{R}^3 has curvature $K \le 0$, $K = -[f''(0)]^2 < 0$ at the origin, and is flat at all points (x,y) for which $\max\{|x|,|y|\} \ge 1$. It would be interesting to have counterexamples in even dimensions greater than 2 as well.

We begin with terminology and some auxiliary propositions. Let M be a smooth, n-dimensional, Riemannian manifold, and let $B_s(p_0)$ be an open ball centered at p_0 in M^n , which is contained in a normal neighbourhood of p_0 . Its boundary $\partial B_s(p_0) = S_s(p_0)$, a so-called *geodesic hypersphere*, is a compact, orientable hypersurface, topologically equivalent to the sphere S^{n-1} . We wish to give sufficient conditions for the second fundamental form of $S_s(p_0)$ to be semidefinite (that is, not indefinite). If d denotes the Riemannian distance in M, we define the smooth function $g: M \to R$ by $g(p) = (1/2)[d(p_0,p)]^2$; its Hessian $\nabla^2 g$ is a 2-covariant tensor defined by $\nabla^2 g(X,Y) = \langle \nabla_X \operatorname{grad} g,Y \rangle$. Let $p \in S_s(p_0)$, and denote by γ the unit-speed geodesic with $\gamma(0) = p_0$ and $\gamma(s) = p$. The unit vector $\gamma'(s)$ is what we shall call the *outer normal* of $S_s(p_0)$ at p. Let $A_{\gamma'(s)}$ be the shape operator of $S_s(p_0)$ at p in the direction $\gamma'(s)$, that is, for $X \in T_p S_s(p_0)$, we have by definition $\nabla_X N = -A_{\gamma'(s)} X$, where N stands for the unit-normal field to $S_s(p_0)$ com-
