On Power Compactness in a Banach Space

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1. Introduction. Let X and Y be complex infinite dimensional Banach spaces, and let B(X,Y) denote the collection of all bounded linear operators from X to Y. We shall say that a sequence (T_n) in B(X,Y) has property P if for every bounded (x_n) in X there exists a positive integer k such that the sequence $(T_k x_n)_{n=1}^{\infty}$ has a convergent subsequence. Similarly, if for each bounded (x_n) in X there is a positive integer k such that $(T_k x_n)_{n=1}^{\infty}$ has a weakly convergent subsequence, we say that (T_n) has property Q. D. G. Tacon, using techniques from non-standard analysis, showed in [7] that every sequence of operators with property P(Q) contains a compact (weakly compact) operator. For compact operators on a Hilbert space the result has also been obtained by Jose Barria [1]; his proof is based on a deep result of P(Q). Voiculescu [8]. The purpose of this note is to prove both results in the Banach space setting, using results involving the representation of the Calkin algebra and generalized Calkin algebra [2], [3], [4]. However, the authors would like to point out that many of these ideas are direct translations to a standard setting of Tacon's elegant results.

The remainder of the paper is divided into three parts. We first use Chadwick and Wickstead's construction in [4] of a representation of the Calkin algebra to show that any sequence (T_n) in B(X,Y) satisfying property P contains a compact operator. This part is quite straightforward, since the idea of the proof is not lost in a forest of technicalities. Then we generalize the result of Chadwick and Wickstead to obtain a representation of the generalized Calkin algebra, B(X,X)/W(X,X), where W(X,Y) is the collection of all weakly compact operators from X to Y. Finally, we use this new construction to show that any sequence (T_n) in B(X,Y) satisfying property Q contains a weakly compact operator.

To this end we establish some notation. If \mathcal{U} is a free ultrafilter of N, $x \in \ell_{\infty}(X)$, and $y \in X$, we say that x converges to y along \mathcal{U} , written

$$x \to y$$

iff for each $\varepsilon > 0$ the set

$$\{i \in N : ||x_i - y|| < \varepsilon\}$$

belongs to \mathcal{U} . Similarly, x weakly converges to y along \mathcal{U} , written
