## The Cauchy Problem for Hyperbolic Operators with Non-smooth Characteristic Roots

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**1. Introduction.** In this paper, we shall study the Cauchy problem for some class of hyperbolic differential operators with non-smooth characteristic roots. A typical example of our class is as follows: Let  $t \in \mathbf{R}$ ,  $\ell \in \mathbf{Z}_+$ ,  $x = (x', x'') \in \mathbf{R}^{p'+p''}$ ,  $y \in \mathbf{R}^q$  and

$$(1.1) P = D_t^2 + ((t^2 + |x'|^2)^{\ell} \Delta_x + \Delta_y + Q$$

where Q is a first order differential operator. In this example, since the characteristic roots of P are not smooth at  $t=x'=\eta=0$ , it is impossible to prove a well-posedness of the Cauchy problem, using pseudo-differential operators with the symbols defined by characteristic roots. However, a difference of two characteristic roots is greater than

$$C_1((t^2 + |x'|^2)^{\ell} + |\eta|^2 r^{-2})^{1/2} r$$
, where  $r^2 = |\xi|^2 + |\eta|^2$ .

This fact suggests if we define a weighted symbol class associating to a degeneration of P, we can prove a well-posedness of the Cauchy problem for P, using a well-known energy inequality method like a strictly hyperbolic case, i.e.,  $\ell = 0$ .

Using a technique of [6], which was used to construct a fundamental solution of the Cauchy problem for P in the case of p' = q = 0 (in this case, the characteristic roots are smooth), we may assume the characteristic roots of P are essentially smooth. By this fact and an energy inequality method used in [7], we shall prove the following.

**Theorem for simple example.** (See Theorem 5.2 and 6.2.) The following two statements are equivalent:

- i) The Cauchy problem for P is well-posed in  $C^{\infty}$  and the solution has a finite propagation speed.
- ii) Let Q be  $aD_t + bD_x + cD_y + d$ , where a, b, c, d are smooth functions. Then  $(D_t^j D_{x'}^{\alpha'}, b)(0, 0, x'', y) = 0$  if  $j + |\alpha'| < \ell 1$ .

Since a proof of the part from i) to ii) is in [3], in this paper we shall prove that statement ii) implies statement i).
