Scattering Theory for the Wave Equation with a Short Range Perturbation. II

6. Introduction. A general treatment of scattering theory for the wave equation with a short range potential in spaces of dimension $n \ge 3$ was presented in Part I of this work [8]. In Part II we give a parallel development for dimensions one and two.

We again treat the wave equation:

$$(6.1) u_{tt} = Lu = \partial_i a_{ii} \partial_i u - qu,$$

where the matrix $(a_{ij}(x))$ is $C^{(1)}$ and everywhere positive, q is locally L_2 , and for r = |x| > R

(6.2)
$$|a_{ij} - \delta_{ij}| \le C/r^{\alpha} \ge |\partial a_{ij}| \quad \text{for some } \alpha > 1,$$
$$|q| \le C/r^{\beta} \quad \text{for some } \beta > 2.$$

We also require the unique continuation property for the eigenfunctions of L. We take for the unperturbed equation

$$(6.3) u_{tt} = L_0 u = \Delta u,$$

with initial data $u(x,0) = f_1(x)$ and $u_t(x,0) = f_2(x)$. Denoting the data pair $\{f_1, f_2\}$ by f, the energy form for (6.3) is

(6.4)
$$E_0(f) = \int (|\nabla f_1|^2 + |f_2|^2) dx.$$

The essential difference between $n \ge 3$ and n < 3 arises from the fact that when n = 1 or 2 the completion with respect to E_0 of $C_0^{\infty}(R^n)$ data contains data of the form $\{c,0\}$. Denoting the solution operators for the perturbed and unperturbed wave equations by U and U_0 , respectively, it is easy to see that

$$(6.5) U_0(t)\{c,0\} = \{c,0\}$$

and hence, for a nontrivial perturbation, the limit as t becomes infinite of $U(-t)U_0(t)\{c,0\}$ does not exist.

Since the wave operators

$$(6.6) W_{\pm} = \operatorname{st} \lim_{t \to \pm \infty} U(-t) U_0(t)$$
