An Orbital Perspective on Square-Integrable Representations

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Introduction and terminology. In this paper we shall consider the most general kind of square-integrable representations of Lie groups. In fact there is now a single unified method—the Orbit Method—for describing the harmonic analysis and representation theory of an arbitrary Lie group (the method is developed fully in [5]). It is well known—and highlighted by [13]—that the square-integrable representations play a fundamental role in the harmonic analysis of all Lie groups. Thus it is important to understand as fully as possible what position those representations occupy in the Orbit Method. We shall be concerned with a host of problems surrounding that idea in this paper. The main results are: Theorem 1 a criterion for square-integrable representations in terms of open orbits; Theorem 3—an orbital realization of an arbitrary square-integrable representation; Theorem 5—which generalizes a key property of square-integrable representations to generic irreducible representations, and is related to [13, Theorem A]; Proposition 6—a simplified construction of square-integrable representations in the special case of H-groups; Proposition 10—a distinguishing property of square-integrable representations. To some extent these constitute a potpourri of results, no one of which is the most important. But I feel it is useful, first—as the title suggests for placing square-integrable representations into the perspective that has come to dominate the subject, and second as a completion of the circle of ideas developed in [10]-[13].

We establish now the terminology of the paper. G will be a Lie group, $\mathfrak g$ its Lie algebra, $\mathfrak g^*$ the real linear dual. We write $\mathscr{AP}(G)$ for the set of admissible, well-polarizable elements in $\mathfrak g^*$ (see [5], [10]). For each $\phi \in \mathscr{AP}(G)$ we write G_{ϕ} for the stability group, G_{ϕ}^0 its identity component, and $\mathfrak X_G(\phi)$ for the set of irreducible unitary extensions of "exp $i\phi$ " (actually a canonical projective dual of G_{ϕ}/G_{ϕ}^0 —see [5], [10]). We set $\mathfrak B(G)=\{(\phi,\tau):\phi\in\mathscr AP(G),\tau\in\mathfrak X_G(\phi)\}$. $\mathfrak B(G)$ is naturally a G-space and $\mathfrak B(G)/G$ parameterizes a generic set in $\hat G$ (see [5]). Now suppose Ξ is a unitary character of the center Z_G of G, $\mathfrak z=LA(Z_G)$, and $\mathfrak z=(1/i)d\Xi\in\mathfrak z^*$. We set $\mathfrak g_{\xi}^*=\{\phi\in\mathfrak g^*:\phi|_{\mathfrak z}=\xi\}$, $\mathscr AP_{\xi}(G)=\mathscr AP(G)\cap\mathfrak g_{\xi}^*$, $\mathfrak X_{G,\Xi}=$ the part of $\mathfrak X_G(\phi)$ lying over Ξ (see [5, p. 155]),

$$\mathfrak{B}_{\Xi}(G) = \{ (\phi, \tau) \in \mathfrak{B}(G) : \phi \in \mathcal{AP}_{\xi}(G), \tau \in \mathfrak{X}_{G,\Xi}(\phi) \}.$$

Then $\mathfrak{B}_{\Xi}(G)/G$ parameterizes a generic set in the spectrum of $\operatorname{Ind}_{Z_G}^G\Xi$. Next we
