Decomposition of Banach Space Operators

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It is a long standing open question whether every Riesz operator splits as the sum of a quasinilpotent operator and a compact one (cf. [3,p.83]). It is only known, in general, for operators on a Hilbert space [12]. It is also known for arbitrary spaces under rather stringent conditions [8]. We prove in the paper that the decomposition is valid in a large class of Banach spaces including c_0 and ℓ^p , $1 \le p < \infty$. Furthermore, we extend Stampfli's theorem [11] to these spaces—namely, for any operator T, there is a compact operator K so that $\sigma(T + K)$ is minimal. Finally, in the fourth section, we show how one can adapt Apostol's correction of singular behavior [1] to this setting.

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1. Preliminaries. If $\mathscr X$ is a Banach space, $\mathfrak B(\mathscr X)$ will denote the algebra of bounded linear operators acting on $\mathscr X$, and $\mathscr K(\mathscr X)$ will denote the closed two-sided ideal of compact operators. The spectrum of an operator T will be denoted by $\sigma(T)$; $\sigma_0(T)$ denotes the isolated eigenvalues of finite multiplicity, known as normal eigenvalues. The essential spectrum, $\sigma_e(T)$, is the spectrum of $\pi(T)$, the image of T in the quotient Banach algebra $\mathfrak B(\mathscr X)/\mathfrak K(\mathscr X)$. An operator is called a Riesz operator if $\sigma_e(T) = \{0\}$. Also,

$$\sigma_{\ell e}(T) = \{\lambda : \text{for each } \epsilon > 0, \|(\lambda - T)x\|$$

 $< \varepsilon ||x||$ for all x in some infinite dimensional subspace $\mathcal{M}_{\varepsilon}$.

(This always includes the boundary, $\partial \sigma_{e}(T)$, of $\sigma_{e}(T)$.)

An operator is semi-Fredholm if T has closed range and at least one of $\operatorname{nul}(T)$, the dimension of $\ker(T)$, and $\operatorname{nul}(T^*)$, the dimension of $\ker(T^*)$ or $\mathscr{X}/T\mathscr{X}$ is finite. The index of T is defined by

$$ind(T) = nul(T) - nul(T^*).$$

The set of semi-Fredholm operators is open, and index is a locally constant function invariant under compact perturbations. The set

$$\rho_{s-F}(T) = \{\lambda : \lambda - T \text{ is semi-Fredholm}\}\$$
