## Characterizing Blowup Using Similarity Variables

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§1. Introduction. We are interested in the blowup of solutions of the semi-linear parabolic equation

$$(1.1) \qquad u_t - \Delta u - |u|^{p-1}u = 0 \qquad \text{in } D \times (0,T)$$
 
$$(1.1) \qquad u = 0 \qquad \text{on } \partial D \times (0,T) \,,$$

in n space dimensions, with a subcritical nonlinearity

(1.2)

Our principal results are a bound on the growth rate, and a characterization of the asymptotic behavior of u near blowup. More general semilinear equations  $u_t - \Delta u - f(u) = 0$  are considered in §6, where we establish the same results whenever  $f(u) - |u|^{p-1}u$  grows at most as  $|u|^q$  for some q < p. In the final section, which can be read independently of the others, we apply these results to prove new lower bounds on the blowup rates of certain norms of u.

Our first goal is the growth rate estimate

(1.3) 
$$\sup_{x} |u(x,t)| \le C(T-t)^{-1/(p-1)},$$

where T is the maximal existence time of the  $L^{\infty}$  solution u. It asserts that u blows up at the same rate as the solution of the ordinary differential equation  $v_t - |v|^{p-1}v = 0$ ,

$$v(t) = \pm k(T-t)^{-1/(p-1)}, \quad k = (p-1)^{-1/(p-1)}.$$

Local-in-time existence theory gives the opposite inequality. The bound (1.3) was first proved by Weissler in [40], for radial solutions on a ball with rather special initial data. Friedman and McLeod subsequently proved it in [12] for solutions on a bounded, convex domain, with initial data satisfying

$$u_0 \ge 0, \qquad \Delta u_0 + u_0^p \ge 0.$$
