## Bloch Functions, BMO, and Boundary Zeros

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§1. Introduction. Throughout this paper, n will be an integer, n > 1; the letters U and B will denote the open unit disc in  $\mathbb{C}$  and the open euclidean unit ball in  $\mathbb{C}^n$ , respectively. In [1] it was shown that the monomial

(1) 
$$\pi(z) = n^{n/2} z_1 z_2 \cdots z_n,$$

which maps B onto U has the following pullback property:

If g is holomorphic in U and belongs to the Bloch space, then  $g \circ \pi$  is in BMOA.

(The relevant definitions will be given in §III.)

A similar result was proved in [1] in the context of  $H^p$ -functions. Paula Russo [13], [14] then showed that analogous pullback theorems hold for the map  $\pi\colon B\to U$  defined by

(2) 
$$\pi(z) = z_1^2 + \dots + z_n^2.$$

Our work on the present paper began with the observation that the results mentioned above lead to new information about the boundary values of holomorphic functions in B. For example (see §§VI and VII):

There is an  $f \in BMOA$  (and even in VMOA), not identically 0, with the following property: If  $h \in H^{\infty}(B)$  and if the radial limits of h are 0 at every boundary point where those of f are 0, then  $h \equiv 0$ .

The same is true with  $H^p(B)$  and  $H^q(B)$  in place of BMOA and  $H^{\infty}(B)$ , whenever 0 .

Section VI contains a gap theorem for  $H^1(B)$  which seems to have no analogue in one variable. Here is a special case of it, for n = 2, and  $\pi$  as in (1):
