$Module\ Maps\ and\ Hochschild-Johnson\ Cohomology$

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§1. Introduction. Let us suppose that R is a von Neumann algebra on a Hilbert space H. We may regard the algebra $\mathcal{B}(H)$ of all operators on H as both an R bimodule and an R' bimodule. In an unpublished article [6], Uffe Haagerup proved that any normal completely bounded R' bimodule map $\Phi \colon \mathcal{B}(H) \to \mathcal{B}(H)$ has the form

$$\Phi(b) = \sum x_k b y_k \qquad (b \in \mathcal{B}(H), \ x_k, y_k \in R).$$

In this paper we begin by showing that there is an analogous decomposition for non-normal maps. Using the suggestive notation of [5], we show that the completely bounded R' bimodule maps $\Phi \colon \mathcal{B}(H) \to \mathcal{B}(H)$ are just those of the form

$$\Phi(b) = \int x b y \, dm(x,y) \, ,$$

where m is an appropriate "mean" on $R \otimes R$. To be more precise, given $x,y \in R$, let $\psi_0(x \otimes y)$: $\mathcal{B}(H) \to \mathcal{B}(H)$ be the completely bounded R' bimodule map defined by

$$\psi_0(x \otimes y)(b) = xby.$$

This determines a map ψ_0 from $R\otimes R$ into the R bimodule $\mathcal{M}_{R'}$ of completely bounded R' bimodule maps on $\mathcal{B}(H)$. Slightly modifying a notion of [5], we show that ψ_0 has a unique weak* continuous extension to an isometric weak* homeomorphic R bimodule isomorphism $\psi\colon R\otimes_h^{\wedge\sigma}R\simeq \mathcal{M}_{R'}$, where $R\otimes_h^{\wedge\sigma}R$ is a natural, intrinsically defined completion of $R\otimes R$. This isomorphism has several important consequences. To begin with, the argument shows that if all of the normal states on R are vector states, then any bounded R' module map $\mathcal{B}(H)\to \mathcal{B}(H)$ is automatically completely bounded (Haagerup had proved this for normal maps). On the other hand, under this isomorphism, the quasi–expectations of Bunce and Paschke correspond exactly to the "reduced virtual diagonals" in the tensor product. This enables one to give an elementary proof of the equivalence of σ -amenability, injectivity, and the existence of a normal virtual diagonal for von Neumann algebras. In contrast with the earlier treatments of this result [3], [1], [5], one no longer has to appeal to Connes' famous result that injectivity is
