Potential Theory for Supersolutions of Degenerate Elliptic Equations

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1. Introduction. Let $A: \mathbf{R}^n \times \mathbf{R}^n \to \mathbf{R}^n$ be an operator with degenerated ellipticity, $A(x,h) \cdot h \approx |h|^p$, 1 ; see Section 2 for the precise assumptions. Weak solutions of the (usually nonlinear) equation

$$(1.1) \nabla \cdot A(x, \nabla u) = 0$$

are always continuous and we call them A-harmonic [S], [HK1]. A typical example of the equations considered is the p-Laplace equation

$$\nabla \cdot (|\nabla u|^{p-2} \nabla u) = 0;$$

the solutions of which are customarily called p-harmonic.

A function u in an open set $G \subset \mathbb{R}^n$ is A-superharmonic if

- (1.2) u is lower semicontinuous (lsc),
- $(1.3) -\infty < u \le +\infty$, and
- (1.4) for each domain $D \subseteq G$ and for each A-harmonic function $h \in C(\bar{D})$, $h \leq u$ in ∂D implies $h \leq u$ in D.

In a joint paper with J. Heinonen [HK1] we have shown that weak supersolutions of (1.1) are A-superharmonic when properly pointwise redefined, see Proposition 2.9 below, and therefore the definition above allows us to study also supersolutions as pointwise defined functions. In a nonlinear situation this approach was apparently first used when S. Granlund, P. Lindqvist and O. Martio [GLM1] introduced subextremals for variational integrals of the type $\int F(x,\nabla u)\,dx \approx \int |\nabla u|^n\,dx$. In subsequent papers they considered potential theoretical aspects of subextremals with applications to function theory [GLM1-2], [LM1-2], [Lq]. Later J. Heinonen and the present author took up the study of general A-superharmonic functions and their nonlinear potential theory; several analogues to classical potential theory were found, see [HK1-3]. This approach
