## On a Theorem of Kempf and Ness

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Let G be a complex reductive algebraic group and K a maximal compact subgroup of G. Consider a finite dimensional complex linear representation V of G. Let N be the square of the norm function obtained from a K-invariant Hermitian metric on V. Kempf and Ness prove in [5] that the function N, restricted to G-orbits in V, has remarkable properties. Namely, if O is such an orbit, then any critical point of the restriction of N to O is a point where this function assumes its absolute minimum, and the critical set, if it is non-empty, is a K-orbit and is a non-degenerate critical submanifold in the sense of Bott [2]. They prove this by analysing special functions on  $\mathbf{R}^n$  of the type  $\sum e^{H_i(x)}$  ( $x \in \mathbf{R}^n$ ), where the  $H_i$  are affine functions, apply this analysis to prove their result for an algebraic torus, and finally reduce the general problem to that for a torus, using standard facts about the Cartan decomposition of reductive groups [4, 9].

Our observation is that the function N is a strictly plurisubharmonic function on V and remains so when restricted to any complex submanifold of V; hence the result of Kempf and Ness should hold for any K-invariant strictly plurisubharmonic function defined on a G-orbit. The principal aim of this paper is to prove that this is indeed so. Our proof is different from that of Kempf-Ness and reduces to the observation that a plurisubharmonic function on the complex plane which depends only on one variable must be convex. We then draw some immediate consequences regarding holomorphy hulls of K-invariant domains in complexifications of K-orbits. We also give a description of those homogeneous spaces of G which have at least one totally real K-orbit and use this to give another proof of Matsushima's characterization of Stein spaces of G [7, 1]. Here it should be mentioned that the principal interest of Kempf-Ness in [5] is to give criteria for closedness of G-orbits.

**Proposition.** Let H be a closed complex subgroup of G and  $\varphi$  a K-invariant strictly plurisubharmonic function on G/H. If the critical set of  $\varphi$  is non-empty, then it is a K-orbit and any critical point of  $\varphi$  is a point where  $\varphi$  assumes its absolute minimum.

The proof depends on the following lemmas which are of independent interest.
