## Invariant Manifolds and Inertial Forms for Parabolic Partial Differential Equations

ABSTRACT. In this paper we consider a semilinear parabolic partial differential equations of the form

(1) 
$$\frac{\partial u}{\partial t} = \Delta u + F(x, u, \nabla u) \quad \text{in } \Omega \subset \mathbf{R}^N$$

with periodic boundary condition.

Under suitable assumptions on F and  $\Omega$ , we show (by applying the inertial manifold theory) that there exists a finite dimensional smooth manifold  $\mathcal{M}$  which attracts exponentially all solutions of (1).

By considering the dynamics on  $\mathcal{M}$ , we will then find a finite-dimensional system of ordinary differential equations that describes completely the long-time dynamics of (1).

1. Introduction. Let  $\Omega = (0, L_1) \times (0, L_2)$ . We are concerned with the asymptotic dynamics of a certain type of semilinear parabolic differential equation, namely,

(1.1) 
$$u_t = \Delta u + F(x, u, \nabla u) \quad \text{in } \Omega.$$

We assume u is scalar and, for boundary conditions, we take a space-periodic boundary condition even though most of all the results are applicable to the Dirichlet and Neumann boundary conditions. We can also extend our results to parabolic systems.

Let F(x,u,p) be a sufficiently smooth function defined on  $\Omega \times \mathbf{R} \times \mathbf{R}^2$ . We assume that (1.1) admits a dissipative dynamical system (see Hale (1988), Temam (1988)). More precisely, throughout this paper we assume that the unique regular solution of (1.1) exists for all time  $t \geq 0$  provided the initial data is in  $H^2_{\text{per}}(\Omega)$  and that the solution becomes sufficiently regular for t > 0—see Henry (1981). In particular, we assume that the global attractor  $\mathcal{A}$  and an absorbing ball  $\mathcal{B}$  of radius  $\rho_0$  exist in  $H^4_{\text{per}}(\Omega)$ , where

$$H^m_{\mathrm{per}}(\Omega) = \Big\{ u : u = \sum_{k \in \mathbf{Z}^2} c_k e^{2\pi i (k_1 x_1/L_1 + k_2 x_2/L_2)}, \ \bar{c_k} = c_{-k}, \ \sum_{k \in \mathbf{Z}^2} |k|^{2m} |c_k|^2 < \infty \Big\}.$$
