Hausdorff Dimension of Multiple Points of the (N,d) Wiener Process

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1. Introduction. Let $W^{N,d}$ denote the (N,d) Wiener process with values in d-dimensional Euclidean space, i.e.,

$$W^{N,d}(t,\omega) = (W_1(t,\omega), \dots, W_d(t,\omega)) \in \mathbb{R}^d,$$

where $t \in \mathbb{R}^N_+$ and the component W_i 's are independent, separable Gaussian processes with zero means and covariance

$$EW_i(s)W_i(t) = \prod_{j=1}^{N} (s^j \wedge t^j), \qquad 1 \le i \le d,$$

where $s=(s^1,\ldots,s^N),\ t=(t^1,\ldots,t^N).$ In this paper, for $W^{N,d},$ we get the following result:

Theorem. Let $P_1, ..., P_k \subset \mathbb{R}^N$ be compact sets without common parts and Int $P_i \neq \emptyset$ $(1 \leq i \leq k)$. Denote

$$M_k(P) = \{x \in R^d \mid \exists \underline{t} = (t_1, \dots, t_k) \in P = P_1 \times \dots \times P_k,$$

$$such \ that \ W^{N,d}(t_1) = \dots = W^{N,d}(t_k) = x\},$$

$$M_k = \{x \in R^d \mid \exists \underline{t} = (t_1, \dots, t_k) \in (R^N)^k$$

$$such \ that \ W^{N,d}(t_1) = \dots = W^{N,d}(t_k) = x\}.$$

If $d \ge 2N$, $2Nk \ge (k-1)d$, then

$$\dim M_k(P) = 2Nk - (k-1)d$$
 almost surely,
$$\dim M_k = 2Nk - (k-1)d$$
 almost surely holds,

where $\dim A$ denotes the Hausdorff dimension of the set A.
