Green, in treating Laplace's equation, was the first to base integrating factors on solutions which are functions of the distance between two points. Other writers have extended the idea to equations of the hyperbolic and parabolic types and to damped equations. Riemann was the first to discover that in the case of a damped equation the Green potential should involve a Bessel function of the above mentioned distance. Hadamard² has extended the Green potential

This paper constitutes a part of a theory of linear partial differential equations developed under the direction of E. W. Titt, and is one of a series of joint papers which present the parts of the theory which are common to all partial differential equations. The students listed as contributing authors, in the order mentioned, entered the work before the general theory began to materialize and took over the tremendous load of computation required when the knowledge of one equation contributed relatively little to the knowledge of another.
